

## Mary C. Dodd Honors Program

Students accepted into the Mary C. Dodd Honors program benefit from a wide-ranging and interdisciplinary set of seminar-style courses focused on the cultivation of "lived wisdom" and an honors concentration in their major area of study.

## **Honors Humanities Minor**

The Honors Humanities minor is an interdisciplinary engagement of the fundamental questions of human existence for the purpose of contextualizing and enriching students' work in a particular academic discipline.

Admission to the Honors Humanities minor is limited to students who have enrolled in the Mary C. Dodd Honors program. Mary Dodd Honors students must complete all of the CAS General Education requirements for graduation with a Bachelor's Degree. Many of the courses in the Honors Humanities minor may be applied toward CAS General Education requirements.



## Honors Scholarship Concentration in a Major Area of Study

Mary Dodd Honors Students also pursue an Honors Scholarship Concentration within their primary academic area(s) of interest which culminates in an independent research/creative project under the direction of a faculty mentor from their primary major(s).



## Graduating from the Honors College with Distinction as a Mary C. Dodd Honors Student

Upon successful completion of the Honors Humanities Minor and an Honors Scholarship Concentration in a major area of study, students graduate from the Honors College with honors distinction as a Mary C. Dodd Honors Student. Students must maintain a 3.5 cumulative GPA and a 3.0 GPA in their coursework in the Honors Humanities minor.
