A. Statement of Purpose

Describe your proposed project. In a clear and concise manner, this overview should address the following:

- 1. What is the nature and purpose of this scholarship project? Specify the central question(s) and/or problem(s) you will address.
- 2. Describe the method(s) you will employ to address your topic. Explain why you chose this particular methodology.
- 3. Comment on the contribution(s) you anticipate this scholarship project will make to your own career preparation and or personal growth.
- 4. Formulate your initial argument or hypothesis

B. Review of Relevant Literature

Give a written, narrative summary of pertinent background and context for your project. This section can be thought of as a "verbal map" explaining to the reader where your research will fit into and contribute to the broader discipline or field of research. It should offer a summary of previous work and point toward the relevance of the current study. Work with your Faculty Mentor to determine the specific formatting, organization, and length of the Literature Review, according to the standards of your field. (Most Literature Reviews will be 5-10 pages.)

C. Annotated Bibliography

Provide an annotated bibliography of the critical resources related to your topic and research. A typical completed bibliography will include approximately 25-40 references for a project of this size. Annotations should include: type of material (e.g., book, article), author(s), central thesis, school of thought, methodology, and potential relevance to your topic or research.
